

# Would You Want This Man To Be Your Preacher?

Whenever a man is "looked" at to preach for a congregation, he is examined closely. The members of the church may judge him on where he went to school, the way he dresses, his personality, who he knows, where he has preached before, how long he was there, etc. Of course, his teaching is a part of their evaluation. Different Christians and congregations have different attitudes about this. Some want a man to "preach the word" (2 Tim. 4:2). Others want him to tickle their ears (2 Tim. 4:3-4).

6. Refused to help a woman until pressed to do so.
7. Answered a question with a question and then refused to talk anymore about the issue.
8. Told men who were well educated in the Bible, they did not know what they were talking about.
9. Made a congregation so mad by his words that they ran him out of town and tried to kill him.
10. Taught that men and women must hate their families.
11. Refused to give food to those who asked him for it.
12. Said that some Christians made him want to puke.
